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

The Repetition Test: Day 1


He asked his sister in the kitchen. He asked his mother in the car. He asked his father in the bedroom. No luck.

know a lot, but you don't know everything."


It irked him when his mother said that. He did know everything. Well, almost everything and that was close enough to count.

Actually, I prefer misunderstood genius on the cutting edge of science.






"Baba! Baba! Guess what!" JT shouted. "What, bruh?" his father asked. "Mbtsedwehftadomputimefoamwrk!"




But did Jaden Toussaint give up? No way!

Having a super big brain had its advantages.




JT knew that all this problem needed was some serious thinking. Some superpowered brain power, if you know what I mean.


That didn't happen either.
